Statement of Policy Regarding the Handling of American Temperance Society Dues

1. Conference workers, district leaders, pastors, church elders, church treasurers, church missionary secretaries, and church temperance secretaries should become thoroughly acquainted with our annual pledge-signing campaign and membership drive and with our general financial policies regarding the handling of membership dues.

2. Information relative to these will bear repeating over and over again until the program is well understood by all our church leaders.

3. The church temperance secretary is primarily responsible for the promotion of the annual pledge-signing campaign and membership drive.

4. The church temperance secretary is to pass all membership blanks, together with the membership dues, to the local church treasurer weekly.

5. The church treasurer is to record the names and addresses of all members, designating the type of membership each is enlisted in, and in the space provided for this purpose, enter the amount of cash received.

6. The record should be made out in triplicate. One copy should be passed to the local church temperance secretary, one copy should be retained by the church treasurer, and one copy, together with 75 per cent of the membership dues, should be forwarded to the conference treasurer.

7. The conference treasurer is to forward 50 per cent of all temper-

ance funds received by the local church treasurer to the union to the credit of the American Temperance Society

8. The membership record blanks are to be turned over to the local conference temperance secretary.

The Circulation of Listen on a National Scale

Our second major objective is to promote the circulation of *Listen* on a national scale among public officials, clergymen, physicians, dentists, teachers, law-enforcement officials, school and public libraries. The following plans for the circulation of *Listen* on a national scale have been agreed upon:

Listen as a missionary organ

A. The circulation of Listen as a missionary organ should be listed as one of our major projects in every church.

B. Plans heve been perfected whereby Listen may be mailed out to such individuals in the community as the local church may agree on at a special rate.

C. For every \$5 sent to the book and Bible house for this purpose, the church may send in the names and addresses of ten people.

D. This rate applies only when Listen is used for missionary purposes, and is not to include subscriptions to our own people.

E. A portion of the 25 per cent retained by the local church could well be used for this purpose.

F. All such orders should be handled by the church missionary secretary and placed through the book and Bible house.

G. The book and Bible house will send such lists to the Pacific Press Publishing Association.

Listen in the single copy sales field

A. We trust that hundreds of temperance-minded lay sisters, young people, and others will be encouraged to enter the single copy sales field on a part-time basis.

B. The retail sale of single copies has been fixed at \$.25 per copy.

C. The regular 50 per cent colporteur discount will be granted such magazine workers.

D. All orders for single copies to be sold in this way should be placed with the book and Bible house.

Summary

A. All membership blanks, pledge envelopes, membership dues, and Temperance Day offerings are, therefore, to be handled by the local church and conference treasurers.

B. All orders for single copies and club subscriptions to *Listen* are to pass through the book and Bible house.

Opportunities Abound

Never, in all the glorious history of the work of God, has the church, as now, faced such glowing opportunities and challenges to arise and finish her task. This is the day of God's power.

In the midst of world chaos God's mighty arm is now seen in the breaking open of the darkest parts of the earth to the light of the gospel of truth. Indeed where political upheavals have been the greatest, there the mighty overruling power of God is most clearly manifest in the opening up of new opportunities for the advancement of the everlasting gospel.

India with her hundreds of millions of souls is today one of the most outstanding examples of how God has set His hand to cracking open of the most difficult spots for the gospel to penetrate.

Already, through the Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondence School work in Southern Asia, almost 100,000 enrollees have responded. Among the highest classes of educated and cultured people of India wonderful responses are coming, and many are acknowledging Christ and the Sabbath truth.

This is a new and unheard of thing in all the long years of our work in that darkened land. Many Moslems are calling for light and are turning to Christ. Scores of Hindus, even among the rajahs, are studying this truth and their hearts are yielding to the impressions of God's Spirit upon them. Whole groups of young B-ahman priests have enrolled with their instructors and are intensely interested in what they are discovering of Christ's love and mercy. But we have no workers to contact these interested people.

Throughout the entire heathen world just now God is doing a "new thing." Where we have no evangelists many are calling for baptism and the organization of churches. Our publishing work and medical work are bursting forth in new evidences of God's blessing and power.

From every division of the world field earnest pleas are coming for men and means which we cannot supply. Thousands of newly awakened souls are waiting for the living preacher and teacher and we must send them help. What shall we do? What can we do to quickly answer these myriads of calls?

Because of the fact that the General Conference has had to reduce its operating funds and reserves to a point beyond which it is not safe to go, the treasury finds itself facing a very difficult situation. To cut further into these reserves could endanger the stability of our foreign mission work and cause our missionaries to face a most serious situation should depression come.

During our recent Spring Council the needs of our world-wide program and this serious financial problem were squarely faced by our general, union and local conference leaders. After most careful consideration we felt led to call upon our people everywhere to do a "new thing" for God in order to answer His great challenge of opportunity, and the following action was taken:

"In view of the critical situation confronting our mission program because of our inability with our present financial resources to meet the crying needs on every hand,

"VOTED, That we propose to our people throughout North America that they make a covenant with the Lord as individuals that for a period of one year, in view of the continuing blessing of the Lord in respect to the material things of life, they will personally increase their weekly Sabbath school offerings by fifty per cent. That conference executives join the Sabbath school secretaries in promoting the plan in the regular church service, so that all members of the church may have a part in it."

It will be noticed that while the Sabbath school is particularly mentioned, yet it is intended that our entire church membership be asked to respond. Many of our dear people, some 60,000, do not attend Sabbath school and therefore should not stop at merely a fifty per cent increase in their offerings for missions.

Some of our churches are failing to follow out the plan of receiving a foreign mission offering on each secharmony with the following actions of the General Conference Committee in recent past actions which read as follows:

"WHEREAS. The plan of receiving

"WHEREAS, The plan of receiving an offering for foreign missions in all our churches on the second Sabbath of each month has not been stressed and promoted as in former years; and,

"WHEREAS, During recent times there has been a substantial decline in mission offerings in relation to our tithe income and,

"WHEREAS, a missions offering received at the time of the church service encourages every worshiper to lift up his eyes and look on the fields, therefore

"WE RECOMMEND, 1. That the second Sabbath offering for missions be received regularly in all our churches.

"2. That the second Sabbath offering be added to the list of general offerings and listed in our financial reports, together with the Sabbath school, Ingathering, Midsummer, Week of Sacrifice and Missions Extension offerings.

"3. That the leading responsibility for the promotion of this offering rest with the treasury department of the General Conference." (November 20, 1945).

"WE RECOMMEND, That the missions offering received in our churches on the second Sabbath of each month be termed the Second Sabbath Foreign Missions Offering, and that plans for its further promotion be studied and put into practice by the executive committee." (November 19, 1947).
